Creating Goals with a Learner



STEP 1 - ASK questions

By knowing rotations the student has completed, the preceptor begins to understand the types of patients they have seen.

- What rotations have you completed?
- Can you tell me about the clinical experiences you've had?
- What areas are you interested in?
- Do you have a goal for your time here?

STEP 2 - REFINE goals

Most preceptors know learners may have broad goals; help narrow their scope.

- Is there anything you'd like to learn about today?
- I know you see a lot of patients with [X]...so everything about [X]!

Think about the learner's goals in the context of the patients your learner will have the opportunity to see

• That's a good goal, but a bit ambitious! How about [X]? I have someone coming to see me today who...





STEP 3 - Plan tasks

It's a good to find tasks that are at the intersection of learner interest, your goals for them, and the opportunities provided by the patients they can see.

- I have a patient with diabetes coming. How about learning a foot exam, including use of the monofilament?
- That would be interesting...I've seen a video on using a monofilament but I've never done it myself.
